

Why did you want to become a teacher?



A Level Geography Trip to the Lake District

At the end of September, the year 13 geographers spent a fantastic 4 days collecting data and developing their understanding for their coursework assessments (NEAs) in the beautiful Lake District. The focus of the trip was to investigate elements of both human and physical geography plus develop skills in NEA planning and primary data collection. Over the course of the trip we visited Maryport to assess the extent to which regeneration of ex-fishing towns has been successful, Keswick to investigate strategies used in rural rebranding and took a guided walk (courtesy of Mr Lovatt) to Easedale Tarn to measure corrie orientation. True to form in the Lake District the weather was drizzly, however this didn't stop our wonderful A-level geographers from giving their all, with smiles on their faces.

A Level Business Studies Trip

Mr Cacace and I took the Year 13 and Year 12 Applied Business Studies students to the White Peak Distillery to meet Max and Claire Vaugn and their team. The White Peak Distillery opened in 2016 with the aim of bringing the first commercially distilled Whiskey in Derbyshire. They are based in the Old Wire works in Ambergate and they currently distil a variety of gins and rums whilst they wait for their whiskey to mature. The business students are going to be basing their marketing coursework on this local business. The visit proved invaluable by providing students with the insight into the nature of the problems faced by a new business start up. Students were able to have a tour of



the distillery process and we were able to discover many interesting facts such as the distillery sources, the yeast used in the brewing process from the local Thornbridge brewery, and that the whiskey gets most of its colour and flavour from the barrels it is matured in. Max, Claire and their team we're incredibly welcoming to our youngsters and they took time to explain the difficulties they've encountered alongside the skills and experiences that have helped to make their enterprise a success. This was a thoroughly engaging visit, and we are grateful for the time given by the White Peak Distillery to our school. The White Peak do offer tours to the general public, and I would highly recommend a visit to hear their story and sample their products.




Our current total raised for this year's BBC Children in Need stands at **£1,059.88**

2021 Results

For a second year, students sitting their exams in the summer of 2021 were awarded grades on the basis of evidence collected by their teachers. The Teacher Assessed Grades (TAGs), submitted to the exam boards by our teachers this year, delivered well-deserved, excellent outcomes for our students sitting exams in Year 11 and Year 13. The TAG process involved the setting of a range of assessments and subsequent standardisation and moderation to ensure the grades were reliable and fully reflective of the talents and abilities of our students. We are pleased that the grades our students have now received reflect their hard work and determination, following the significant hurdles they have had to overcome as a result of the national response to COVID-19. As a result, many of our Year 13 students have gone on to the universities and colleges of their choice and are now continuing their studies, whilst others have found apprenticeships and employment across a range of sectors. A large number of our Year 11 students have now returned to the AGS Sixth Form and are undertaking a range of A Levels and vocational courses. Congratulations to all of our **students** on a brilliant response to the challenges we have faced together!

Scanning Electron Microscope on loan from the Natural History Museum

We have been incredibly lucky during our first half of 2021-22 Science. Through term in collaboratively working with the Earthbound project (www.earthbound project.co.uk) in Wirksworth, the National History Museum in London and Longcliffe Quarry, we hosted a scanning electron microscope (SEM) for nearly made the three weeks. We most of this opportunity in Science and linked with the Art department to bring the Earthbound Project to Anthony Gell. Alex Hyde and Kate Bellis, both local artists, ran sessions in Science to bring the story of the hidden layers beneath out feet, including the organisms and rocks that support us all. Several groups from Years 7-13 took part in the Earthbound sessions during Science lessons. Sally Matthews visited the Art department to focus on sculpture, and encapsulated the Earthbound project in the work that students produced. Every science class from Year 7 to 11, had a teacher-led

session in which all students were given the opportunity to use the electron microscope. Dropin sessions at lunches and breaks were used by students, to use the SEM and bring in their own materials to view. We have seen magnified dust mites, teeth, the head of a wasp, crystals, ticks, feathers and much more during the time we have had access to the SEM. One Year 13 A-Level Chemistry student, who had recently synthesised aspirin, used this as a chance to look at the crystals he had produced. We cannot express the gratitude we feel for having had this opportunity and the enjoyment that so many students experienced. However, several students summed up our feelings nicely in these quotes.














2021 Open Evening
