Student Achievements Outside of AGS

Jamie Brough in Year 8 competed at The National Hill Climbing Championships for the second year running, finishing 1st in his age group on both occasions. Hill climbing is quintessentially British; A time trial up a steep hill, short or long. With a crowd of people cheering you on with cowbells, megaphones and anything else that makes a noise, as you gurn up the hill. A mini version of the scenes on Alpe D'huez at the Tour De France.

Last year the National Hill Climbing Championships were here in Derbyshire at Winnats Pass, this year they were on The Old Shoe, near Llangollen in Wales. The Old Shoe is approximately 1 mile long and nearly twice the length of Winnats Pass. With an average gradient of 13.3% and touching 22% in places, it is a beast of a climb, testing the mettle of most cyclists. Jamie competes in various cycling disciplines including cyclocross and on the track.

With BD Youth, riders follow a path that leads to joining a BD Youth team and as part of this team they hopefully compete nationally and internationally. Following on from this they have the BD Youth Academy to further their careers in dressage and other events.

The maths department held two successful Maths Challenge competitions in October. Students in Years 11, 12 and 13 took part in the national Senior Maths Challenge competition, answering a range of challenging problem-solving questions. The standard was high this year with the following AGS students receiving awards:

Gold: Noah Pigott, Georg Fischer and Asha Brabiner all gave strong performances, earning Gold awards and scoring high enough to go forward to the next round, the Senior Kangaroo challenge which they sat in November.

Silver: Henry Tassell and Vinny Wright-Wray

Bronze: Cameron Combellack, Jack Else, Adam Lascelles, Oliver Round, George Allwood, Tom

Bailey, Harriet Limb, Dylan Pittam-Worthy and Nathaniel Round.

In addition to the Senior Maths Challenge, the girls in years 12 and 13 sat the Maths Olympiad for Girls. The paper contains five extended challenging questions which require logic and problem solving skills as well as good presentation of their solutions. The challenge is aimed at encouraging more girls into STEM subjects and giving them the opportunity to show their mathematical talent. All of our students performed very well and Asha Brabiner scored exceptionally highly, earning a Distinction and narrowly missing entrance to the follow on round.

Year 11 and Year 13 CV & Interview Skills Workshops

Getting our older students ready for the world of work and interviews is an important focus for us and one of the ways they need to be ready is to know how to present themselves in the most positive light to future employers or educational institutions.

Four members of the school's Governing Body very kindly gave up their time to share their experience from the world of work with our Year 13 students. Students attended two workshops; one based on CV skills and the other based on interview skills. They were given the most up to date advice and guidance on how to market themselves effectively, as well as benefitting from hearing a wide range of anecdotes of dos and don'ts based on the experiences of some of our governors who work in a range of industries. The workshops were supplemented with detailed notes so students could take them away and use them as they prepare for interviews with Universities, Apprenticeship providers and/or Employers. This work then seamlessly led into a further workshop led by a representative from Nottingham Trent University, who advised students on how to write their Personal Statements for their UCAS applications.

However, it is not just Year 13 who are planning their next steps so we were very lucky to secure a visit from a colleague from the Department for Work and Pensions who came to deliver a CV workshop for a group of our Year 11 students, to ensure they have high quality CVs ready for when they apply to Colleges and Apprenticeships. Students were really pleased that by the end of the session they had a CV that was professional and ready to be used. As with many events in school we benefit from a huge amount of support from our local community and beyond and so we would like to take this opportunity to extend our thanks to everyone who has been involved with our Careers provision and extend the invite to anyone who would like to be involved in the future to get in touch with Mrs Lowe in school.

National Road Safety Week

To mark the start of National Road Safety Week, local company Longcliffe Calcium Carbonates partnered with Anthony Gell School to educate students on how to be safe when cycling or walking near lorries.

The company took an articulated tractor unit and tanker, which can weigh up to 44 tonnes to the school to demonstrate the need for road safety and emphasise the message that 'If you can't see the driver, the driver can't see you'. Year 8 students were taken through several safety-focussed sessions including one which enabled them to sit in the lorry cab and see the blind spots from a driver's perspective.

As well as the lorry exercise, the Longcliffe team also took the students through presentations and a quiz to test and drive home messages around safety precautions they can take when walking or cycling. Students also worked with the School Sports Partnership to look at issues surrounding cycle safety. The students were also all given a "Be Seen, Be Safe" high visibility vest by Longcliffe with lots of students winning prizes for the knowledge they showed they had learned during the sessions.









Year 7 and 8 Careers Workshops

Throughout this term students in Years 7 and 8 have all joined in a Careers Workshop hosted by Emma Cook from the Department of Work and Pensions. The workshops included sessions on Employability skills as well as labour market information for our local area, so students could see the range and types of jobs available in our locality. Students also considered jobs of the future and jobs they never knew existed! Students were also encouraged to consider what their skills and qualities are that will help them as they consider their future pathways. Careers education for students at Anthony Gell takes place in every year group within CR lessons and also in the broad range of activities we organise for students with visitors in school and opportunities outside of school too.

Exhibitors were impressed by the mature approach from our students as they considered their future options and pathways as well as the way that students worked together with staff and their parents to make informed future decisions. Students who visited the Careers Fair reported that they felt better informed about their choices and were feeling more motivated and inspired about their future pathways.







The school welcomed a wide range of exhibitors from the world of Higher Education, Apprenticeships, Further Education, and employment into school on Thursday 10th November for our Careers Fair. We hold the Careers Fair every two years and it is open to all students and their parents in Years 9 - 13. Students are able to meet with organisations and companies from the world of work and education, to think about and start to make informed choices about their future chosen pathways. Hundreds of visitors from Years 9-13 visited the stands which included amongst others; The University of Sheffield, Derby College, our very own Anthony Gell Sixth Form, as well as employers such as Wates Construction, Derby County Community Trust, the NHS, the Armed Services and ICB.





The Careers Fair is one event amongst a very strong programme of Careers provision in school which means that all students receive Careers education, 1:1 interviews with an independant careers specialist, work experience opportunities as well as the development of Employability Skills both in and out of lessons. Virtual Exchange

Anthony Gell has been selected to partner with a school in Toyota City, Japan and participate in a cultural exchange programme. This has been made available through Derbyshire County Council and the local Japanese authority in Aichi. Our partner school is called Inabu J.H.S. It is slightly larger than AGS but has a diverse range of Western language opportunities including English, hence why students from Japan were connected with

AGS via this cultural exchange. There have been 2 meetings (on Thursday lunch times) for students to go to, where we have been tutored in basic Japanese by Stephine Walsh- who is a fluent Japanese speaker and involved in cultural experiences with Derbyshire County Council. We had our first virtual meeting in November. We had to arrive at school by 8.00am as Japan's time is roughly 10 hours ahead of the UK but we were really excited to meet the students from Japan and get to know them!



My group were paired up with two children called Hayato Aoki and Mayuko Matushita, two students in Year 10 studying English at the partner school in Toyota City. They presented a PowerPoint describing Japanese courtesy. Two things I learned was that you have to take your shoes off before entering school as well as at home. It is also polite to hold your bowl of food above the table as it is regarded to be rude to place your bowl on the table because you must respect the table and not spill your food on it. Hayato also wanted to tell us about his favourite drink which he really enjoys and Mayuko wanted to introduce us to Anime, which is cartoon styled action. One famous to show is Naruto and shows Naruto Uzumaki fighting evil with his friends. To conclude, we really enjoyed the experience of a cultural exchange, and we really appreciate the amazing opportunity to virtually meet these Japanese students. We really hope that we get to meet physically in person as we enjoyed the virtual meeting so much!

Accelerated Reader This year has seen us continue our work with Accelerated Reader with students in Year 7, 8 and 9 all receiving a designated reading lesson every fortnight in our library. During this lesson they use the Accelerated Reader Scheme designed to promote reading and also to point students towards books suitable for their reading age with the hope that this will develop in time. When students finish their book, they take a quiz via the website and if they pass this test which checks comprehension, they have the words in that book added to their word count score. Every month the students with the highest word count score that month get a prize and then at the end of the year the student with the overall highest word count score will receive an amazon tablet with big prizes for 2nd and 3rd place too.

The class in each year with the most Accelerated Reader points receive with great excitement a pizza party lesson, last year it was 7G, 8N and Mrs Peat's Year 9 class who were the winners. Thank you very much to AGS Foundation for supplying the prizes.


