
































Year 11 Prom

Year 7 & 8 Technology Projects









Year 7 students have been studying the Bauhaus and Art Deco design movements and have designed their own clocks in these styles. They drew these ideas on CAD (Computer Aided Design) and then used the laser cutter in school to create the shapes. Year 8 have been studying Sustainable Architecture and producing their own designs and models using CAD and the laser cutter.

Liverpool Maths Challenge

MEM (Mathematics Education Merseyside) Liverpool Challenge an academic competition organised annually by Mathematics department University of Liverpool. This year 120 schools took part in the challenge with over 2000 students participating. Anthony Gell students participated in both the Junior Challenge (years 7 & 8) and Senior Challenge (years 9 & 10). Three students performed exceptionally well. Erin Wooliscroft was awarded best in school for the Junior Challenge and Hugh Morris was awarded best in school for the Senior Challenge. Erin and Freya Wilson were both invited to the University of Liverpool on the 16th May to receive their certificates.

The Challenges consisted of problem-solving tasks with a theme of the Ancient Egyptians below is a question from each level.

Junior Maths Challenge Question:

The priestess at Horus' temple has to go up a flight of 5 steps each day. The high priest has decreed that she will ascend the steps one or two at a time. She wants to know if she can do this a different way each day for a week. Is it possible?

How many ways are there of ascending the steps?

The grand staircase has 13 steps. The priest wants to know if he can climb this a different way each day for a year using the same rules as the priestess. Is it possible?

How many ways are there of ascending the grand staircase?

Explain why your answer is correct.

Senior Maths Challenge Question:

Egyptian Fractions

The ancient Egyptians used only unit fractions, so they would write $\frac{3}{4}$ as $\frac{1}{2} + \frac{1}{4}$.

Find the six ways to write 1 as the sum of 4 distinct unit fractions.

Write 1 as a sum of 5 distinct unit fractions, without using $\frac{1}{2}$.
