
6th Form Summer Bridging Work

Task 1- VISUAL ELEMENTS

Photograph at least 35 shots that show a creative response to the visual elements LINE TONE TEXTURE SHAPE PATTERN & COLOUR. You can focus on one element in more detail if you like or photograph a range of different visual elements.

You must look for a range of engaging angles and viewpoints and for you to be as creative as possible. You must be able to convincingly explain what visual element is represented in each of your photographs



We will experiment with a variety of processes and techniques to design and develop ideas using this set of images

Task 2- ALPHABET

Photograph at least 35 shots that effectively represent a letter of the alphabet using photography.

This is a task designed for you to use your creativity and flare for representational imagery, you will need to think carefully about how you will record each letter of the alphabet. Take opportunities to record lettering forms in your environment/ location around you. The lettering can be an abstract link to the original shape of the letter, both capitals or lowercase. Try to use both positive and negative space.

It would be useful to look at the work of David Airey or other photographers and Artists who use letterforms and typography in their work.




Task 3- PORTRAIT
