Among the cascading bustle of the busy streets, a shadow shone. While normally such a thing as shadow was not capable of shining, it did so anyway, a flare of unnatural radiance in the inescapable colour of the world's deepest darknesses: Black. And in but a moment, it was gone, snuffed away by the fearsome light of day.

Was it beauty or tragedy, then, that its life was such a brief flicker against the vastness of time? And was it beauty or tragedy that only one lonely soul ever took notice of it?

That lonely soul, a girl with knotted brown hair eleven summers old, sat weeping on a distended iron bench. Ash and grime defiled her malnourished, bony features as she sat and thought of where she would be sitting if things had been different— if she wasn't alone in the mud-choked metropolis surrounding her.

It was in the middle of this moment of mournful reflection that the shadow lived out its entire short, shining life, and it caught the girl's eye from within the churning crowd of people on the busy street.

Feeling an unexplained rush of volatile adrenaline, the girl leapt to her feet, dried tears marking her ash-covered face as she pushed her way through the tumbling commerce to where the shadow had been. Once she reached the spot, disappointment swelled in her as she realised that the shadow was gone, before the feeling was shunted away to the back of her bedraggled conscience as another shining shadow appeared in the corner of her vision.

She raced after it, a gnawing suspicion growing in her as it vanished once more and another one appeared elsewhere. She followed them through the spires of the city's highest heights and into the flyblown underbelly of its deepest depths, through archway and alley, over bridge and bypass. She followed the flickering un-lights for what seemed like days and days upon end, out of the city and into the dense, crooked woodland beyond. Here the trees arched over her with growing malevolence like hunchbacked despots, and dreadful howls echoed through the trees like the booming laughter of an uncaring, thirsting god.

The shadows led her ever onwards, and all the while she felt a creeping, inescapable feeling; as if she were being watched by some intangible force. On numerous occasions she felt she saw a pair of bright ivory eyes staring at her, but when she turned to look at them, they were gone— merely shadows in the mist.





Key Stage 4 & 5 Careers Week

Years 10 and 12 have had a range of fantastic opportunities during our Careers Week 2025, with more than 30 visitors in school delivering careers talks and representing a huge range of jobs and careers.

Staff from the Department of Work and Pensions have visited school to give talks about apprenticeship pathways and deliver CV workshops. The Army came in to discuss career opportunities and deliver a team building workshop on the astro. The Police delivered an employability skills workshop and we conducted a large number of mock interviews. We also welcomed ASK apprenticeships into school, to deliver a parent/carer workshop on Apprenticeships, and Buxton and Leek college who are a local apprenticeship provider.

Year 10 students took part in a 'virtual work experience' during Careers Week, where they were able to explore a huge range of career pathways that are bespoke to their own personal interests. All of Year 10 had the opportunity to visit our 6th form provision, and either a local college or a university, to see what their future may hold in terms of their educational next steps. We thoroughly enjoyed taking students to Derby College, the University of Nottingham and the University of Sheffield. This, alongside a 'me and my degree' workshop from the Higher Education Partnership Pathway, gave students a real flavour of the future opportunities available to them. A great careers week has been had by all and we look forward to continuing to support all of our students as they take these important next steps.

Our Year 12 geographers recently returned from an incredible residential trip to the Lake District, staying in the beautiful village of Grasmere — a perfect base for exploring both the physical and human landscapes of this iconic region.

Students braved the mountain walks in the Easedale Valley,

where they mapped glacial features and examined evidence of glacial change in the stunning upland terrain. These real-world investigations brought textbook case studies to life!

In the field, they also conducted a carbon analysis of soils and trees; deepening their understanding of the role vegetation and soil play in carbon storage — a vital topic in climate studies.

On the human geography side, the group visited Maryport to explore urban regeneration schemes and Keswick to investigate rebranding strategies aimed at sustainable tourism and economic revival.

The students were absolutely fantastic throughout — engaged, curious, and full of enthusiasm. They threw themselves into every activity, worked together in the field, made new friendships and supported one another brilliantly. The teachers were thoroughly impressed by their attitude, teamwork, and the thoughtful questions they asked along the way. It was a joy to watch them learn and grow in such a unique and inspiring environment.

The trip offered a brilliant mix of hands-on learning, fresh air, and unforgettable landscapes — an inspiring few days for our future geographers!

Eight of our Year 7 students recently took part in a truly immersive maths workshop, that combined cutting-edge technology with real-world problem solving. Using Virtual Reality (VR) headsets, the students were transported to the Philippines, where they worked alongside a local fisherman to help him maximise his daily catch.

Over the course of a 90-minute session, the students used their mathematical skills to solve challenges related to fishing routes, catch predictions, and resource management—all within a realistic virtual environment. It was a unique opportunity to see how maths can be applied in everyday life, even in places and professions far from our own.















2025 Well Dressing

1000 Miles for 1000 Smiles



On Friday 13th of June, a heartfelt journey passed through Anthony Gell School as part of the inspiring "1000 Miles for 1000 Smiles" challenge. The walk is being completed in memory of Eve, one of our students who sadly passed away last year from a brain tumour. Eve's uncle, Richard, is walking 1000 miles to raise vital funds for children with cancer — a mission that holds deep meaning for our school community.

Eve's family began their walk in Ashbourne and made their way to Anthony Gell School, where they were warmly welcomed by staff and joined by seven of Eve's friends. Together, they walked down the school drive and around the top field, pausing at the spot where a memorial bench for Eve will soon be placed — a beautiful tribute to her memory. The walk continued through Wirksworth before heading back to Ashbourne, ending at St Oswald's School, where Eve was a pupil before coming to Anthony Gell.

So far, an incredible £50,779 has been raised towards a target of £75,000. The money is already making a difference — supporting brain tumour research, helping Ward E39 at the Queen's Medical Centre by funding £1,500 worth of fans, and donating £2,000 to The Princess Trust to provide wigs for children who've lost their hair during treatment.

With 389.34 miles completed so far, Richard and the team aim to reach 1000 miles by November 30th, 2025. It's a powerful tribute to Eve and a meaningful way to support others facing similar challenges.

Setting Sail for the Ellen MacArthur Trust

Anthony Gell School students will be setting sail for charity after Mr Watts casts off with the Ellen MacArthur Trust. If you talk to any longstanding member of Anthony Gell's learning community, it won't be too long before they say "you know Ellen MacArthur went to this school, don't you?"

Ellen MacArthur (MBE) is a hugely inspirational member of the school's alumni, having become one of the world's most famous and successful professional sailors. Ellen has talked in interviews with fondness of her time at AGS, and of tucking herself away in the library to read Swallows and Amazons, Arthur Ramsome's tale of a youthful and adventurous summer sailing adventure. Having played an instrumental part in establishing a long tradition of youth sailing at AGS, Ellen's legacy at the school is still going strong, as students have enjoyed the school's sailing programme this summer.

After a brief hiatus during Covid, the school has re-established a strong

partnership with Carsington Sailing Club and, moving forward, AGS students are going to develop their sailing skills with some of our keenest adventures building towards the RYA's junior seamanship qualification.

One member of the AGS community who has spent a fair bit of time at sea is Deputy Headteacher Mr Watts. During the Easter holidays, he sailed around the Western Isles of Scotland and in advance of casting off from Largs, Mr Watts visited the Ellen MacArthur Trust, the charity Ellen MacArthur set up to support young people who have been treated for cancer.

Mr Watts met with employees of the charity who talked about the amazing work they do to support young people living with cancer before embarking on an epic

adventure circumnavigating several of the Scottish islands.

Mr Watts commented "I'm lucky enough to have very talented sailors as friends who occasionally invite me out to support them as a crew member. Sailing has provided me with some of the most amazing adventures, and I think it's fantastic that we can provide students at Gell with the opportunity to get out on the water". Having been inspired by his time with the Trust and sailing with his friends, Mr Watts's hope is to integrate the school's sailing programme with a campaign to raise money for the Ellen MacArthur Trust and he is currently working with Mr Lomax, the school's Outdoor Education Coordinator, to create a pathway for the coming academic year.



Each year, students, staff and friends of AGS come together for a special event, during which we reflect on our school's past and celebrate the present. This year, we were pleased to be joined by AGS governors, AG Foundation Trustees, Gell Friends, ex-students, Freedom Leisure, partner Primary Schools, and local dignitaries.

Our guests were entertained by representatives from the current student body, with various musical renditions alongside student speeches. The focus of this year's event was the momentous change which happened in 1965, when Wirksworth Grammar School became Anthony Gell School and Comprehensive education arrived in this part of the Derbyshire Dales.
