



What a community effort - and what a ride!




## CHURSH WESD

### Students Experience Live Sumo Wrestling at the Royal Albert Hall


On Friday 17th October, a group of our students travelled to London for an unforgettable cultural experience watching live sumo wrestling at the iconic Royal Albert Hall.

### Warm Derbyshire Welcome for Our Japanese Visitors

In September, for the second successive year, eleven AGS families welcomed students from Toyota City in Japan into their homes. Arriving after a delay in Hong Kong and almost two days of travelling, the Japanese students (and staff) were met with torrential rain and temperatures a good deal lower than the 34C it had been in Japan. Fortunately, their welcome was much warmer than the climate and trips to anywhere from Matlock to Skegness were planned, with a Sunday roast or fish and chips on many a menu.

The students stayed for a total of five nights and spent three days in school. They heard all about the history of AGS and saw first hand what school life in Britain is like. They even had a cooking lesson with Miss Buxton and a lesson on the curiosities of Derbyshire and England with Mr Flint, including watching clips of Shrovetide football and trying some Marmite and a pickled onion or two.



The school is intensely grateful to the families who volunteered to be part of the homestay; it could not have happened without them. The students acting as 'buddies' to their Japanese counterparts were also a credit to the school. We hope to have Japanese students over again next Autumn and further develop our relationship with not only Toyota City, but also Masutomi Junior High School, our partner school in Japan. Kazumi Hamada, Headteacher of Masutomi, accompanied the Japanese students, having welcomed Gell students to her school in February. We look forward to seeing Kazumi-san and Japanese students again soon.



### TAKING AIM IN THE AGS


ADVENTURER PROGRAMME!

Throughout the day, students investigated how an environmental variable can affect the distribution of species within an ecosystem. Working in groups, they designed their own methods, collected real field data, and strengthened their practical research skills — all while gaining a deeper understanding of ecological processes in action.

As part of the visit, students also spent time in the Carsington Wildlife Centre, where they learned about the rich habitats and species that thrive in the area. They answered a series of questions designed to help them apply their classroom knowledge to real-world examples, further enhancing their understanding biodiversity of conservation.

The trip offered an invaluable opportunity for students to experience biology beyond the school environment, developing both their scientific thinking and appreciation for the natural world.
