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## OPPORTUNITIES

### College & Sixth Form Exploration

If you are currently in Year 10 and considering what your options are for the end of Year 11, you can go to each college / sixth forms website in September to see when their open day takes place. Remember, you can apply to as many sixth forms / colleges as you like and do not need to make your final decision until results day in August 2027.

Unlike recreational scuba diving, commercial diving is a demanding trade requiring specialised equipment, rigorous safety protocols, and strict certification standards.
